ANTH 324. Field Methods in Archaeology.

Dr. Brian Redmond – M/T/W/Th/F 8:30 AM-4:00 PM – 3-6 credits – CVN45800

This field course is designed to give the student a comprehensive introduction to archaeological field work. All participants will be introduced to the methods of archaeological survey, techniques of hand excavation, artifact identification, and the preparation of field notes and documentation. In large measure this is a “learning through doing” course which is supplemented by formal and informal lectures and discussions about archaeological methods and regional prehistory. The Field School is held as two, three-week sessions of instruction in the field. All participants are required to attend an orientation meeting that is held at the Museum on the first day of each session. The remainder of each session will take place from Monday through Friday at an archaeological site in northeast Ohio. Students are responsible for their own transportation to and from the field site and must bring a sack lunch. All participants will receive a field manual which will provide detailed information on the course and techniques of field work.

ANTH 376. Topics in the Anthropology of Health and Medicine.

Topic: Myth, Magic, & Medicine.

Are mythologies merely stories of falsehoods, is magic nothing more than the outmoded superstitions of folk religions, and what is the nature of their relationship to medicine? By examining a wide variety of anthropological texts, films, and video recordings, this course will help students develop an understanding of how people from around the world (past and present) articulate and experience the spiritual realms of myth, magic and medicine. Our approach will be anthropological, our gaze submarine, excavating the rich stratigraphy (or multiple layers) of symbolic language that lay within and between the performance of myth, magic and medicine. In this course, the goal of our anthropological travels and intellectual excursions through disparate languages and cultures will be to arrive at a place of understanding (neither acceptance or rejection) of myth, magic, and medicine, as well as the radically different notions of what it means to be human-in-the-world that their articulation and performance trace and embrace.

ANTH 379. Topics in Cultural and Social Anthropology.

Topic: Amish Culture & Society.

The Old Order Amish are a highly religious Anabaptist society living a horse and buggy lifestyle in the midst of twenty-first-century life in the United States and Canada. Amish populations live in close proximity to Cleveland. This course will describe the key tenets of Amish society and will focus on the strategies, such as the selective acceptance of technology, which have allowed the Amish to maintain their cultural and religious identity for 300 years while living in the midst of a modernizing U.S. society.
