**SUMMARY STATEMENT**

**My research, publishing, teaching** and related activities are devoted to critically examining how technology and science were integrated into modern society. I study the visions, policies, projects and institutions through which higher learning has been put to cultural uses on national and global scales. My aim is to understand the symbolic and social powers proponents have exerted and the economic and social interdependencies they created through this culture. Major focus is on built environments, international expositions, museums, and institutions of higher education (including single-sex colleges) during the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries in two industrializing nations: France and the United States. In addition to scholarly production, my publications and lectures include those directed at educating more popular audiences in this country and abroad about the forces of scientific and technological change. Research and teaching in the U.S., Sweden and France.
