Capstone & Departmental Honors

The Capstone in Music (MUHI 395A-B) is not required but if taken counts as a Music History elective (section V above) and makes student eligible for Departmental Honors. Music majors who maintain a GPA of 3.75 or above in the major and who complete an ambitious and outstanding Music Capstone project (MUHI 395A-B) can earn Departmental Honors by faculty nomination and vote of the Department of Music faculty. The distinction appears on the transcript, is announced at commencement, and is printed in the commencement program.

The BA Music program requires that 43-51 of the total 120 semester credit hours necessary for the degree be devoted to music study, with the remaining credits devoted to the SAGES and Arts and Sciences general education requirements, a possible minor program, and a liberal selection of elective courses.

General Education Requirements for all Undergraduates SAGES Program and Physical Education Effective Fall 2017

All music majors must fulfill (1) the SAGES Program and Physical Education General Education Requirements for All Undergraduates and (2) the College of Arts & Sciences General Education Requirements. All of these requirements are listed on the following two pages of this form, which are extracted from the online 2017-18 First Year Registration (FYR) Guide, available at <https://case.edu/ugstudies/fyr-guide/cas>. Students pursuing a second degree in a school other than the College of Arts & Sciences must also fulfill any additional General Education Requirements of that School.

SAGES Program Seminars (13 credit hours)

The First Seminar* (4 credit-hours, to be taken in the first semester of enrollment): The First Seminar focuses on the development of critical thinking and communication skills through the use of a variety of approaches, media, and perspectives to explore the human mind and the nature of inquiry. This course is designed to strengthen writing and analytical skills, while building a foundation in ethics, information literacy, and cultural diversity.

As an alternative to these topical seminars, some students may choose FSCC 110: Foundations of College Writing, designed to provide additional writing support.

Students for whom English is a second language and who would benefit from an initial focus on academic English will enroll in FSAE 100: Academic English (3 credit hours) during the fall semester and then continue with FSCC 100: Life of the Mind (4 credit hours) in the spring to complete their First Seminar requirement. Some students for whom English is a second language will go directly into FSCC 100: Life of the Mind in the fall semester.

University Seminars (6 credit-hours, minimum of two seminars, to be completed in the first two years of enrollment)

After completion of the First Seminar, students must complete two University Seminars. A student's First Seminar and two University Seminars must include a course from each of the three thematic areas: Natural World, Social World, and Symbolic World. University Seminars provide continued experience in critical reading, writing, and oral communication as well as information literacy, ethics, and cultural diversity. Each University Seminar explores content determined according to the interests of the faculty. *University Seminars must be completed by end of the fourth semester of enrollment.*

Departmental Seminar and Senior Capstone

Students pursuing the BA Music degree are not required to complete a departmental seminar and senior capstone *in music* if they are also pursuing an additional major or double degree.

Departmental Seminar (3 credit-hours)

[NOTE: MUHI 390 (Topical Seminar) and MUHI 314 (Blues Cultures) may be used to fulfill this requirement]

The Departmental Seminar includes seminar-based discussion as well as instruction and experience in the kinds of writing characteristic of the Departmental Seminar’s discipline. It is taken after the completion of the University Seminars, ordinarily in the fourth – sixth semester of study. The Departmental Seminar may be taken in the department of the student’s major or in another department. *NOTE: Students pursuing a degree in the College of Arts and Sciences may not fulfill the Departmental Seminar requirement with a course that is being used to fulfill and Arts & Humanities, Social Sciences, or Natural & Mathematical Sciences breadth requirement. Courses meeting this requirement include the designation "Approved SAGES Capstone" in their course descriptions. A course that has been designated as a Departmental Seminar and that also falls into the Global and Cultural Diversity category may be used to fulfill both requirements.*

SAGES Senior Capstone (3-6 credit-hours)

The Senior Capstone assimilates the knowledge and skills gained throughout the educational process. Students engage in a unique one or two semester experience designed in consultation with a faculty member. Students must have successfully completed MUHI 201 and MUHI 202 before registering for MUHI 395A.

Each Capstone Experience must include key elements:

- Demonstration of critical thinking and writing skills;
- Regular oversight by the Capstone advisor;
- Periodic reporting of progress;
- Regular writing (e.g. drafts, progress reports, critiques) throughout the project including a final written report which may be a thesis or equivalent document associated with the project activity (e.g. such pursuits as performance, experiment, live case analysis, or creative writing), as approved by the department of capstone origin;
- Oral reports including a final public presentation at the Senior Capstone Fair, a conference, a performance, a public lecture, a teaching presentation, or other, as approved by the department of capstone origin.

Global and Cultural Diversity (3 - 4 credit-hours)

The goal of the Global and Cultural Diversity requirement is to provide students with the opportunity for academic reflection about the variation in human experience. Courses that satisfy this requirement must (1) substantively explore one or more cultures outside the United States, or (2) address in a substantive way ethnic, gender, sexual, religious, or other cultural practices within or outside the United States, so as to provide students with fresh perspectives on their own cultural assumptions, traditions, and experiences. *This course may also be used to fulfill a major, minor, and/or breadth requirement.*
