Dr. Delos Reyes is among the first physicians in the United States to be certified by the American Board of Addiction Medicine, a new independent medical specialty board.

## Mayer-Haber Library at W.O. Walker Center:

Selected Additions to the Mayer Haber Library from the Rocco L. Motto Gift:

Stevenson, George F. *Child Guidance Clinics: A Quarter Century of Development*. New York: The Commonwealth Fund, 1934. WS350.S847 1934

This book traces the patterns of development of child guidance clinics in America, from their beginning in 1909 to 1930. There are references to the clinic in Cleveland, its growth, and its relationship to child welfare agencies and the medical establishment in Cleveland.

Jonathan Engel, the author of the 2008 book, *American Therapy*, refers to this book by the Commonwealth

Fund in his chapter on the child guidance movement.

Nichtenhauser, Adolf, Coleman, Marie L., and Ruhe, David S. *Films in Psychiatry, Psychology and Mental Health*. New York: Health Education Council, 1953. ZWM100.A849f 1953

This catalog reviews 42 films, and lists 50 additional films with short descriptions. The films date from 1935 to 1953, including "Let There Be Light," a 1945 film about war psychosis directed by John Houston. Chapter 4 traces the early 20<sup>th</sup> century history of films focusing on "functions of the mind," and explores the pioneering work of the Russian and German film industries.

Haymaker, Webb, Neuburger, Karl T., and Hurteau, W. W. *Atlas of Neuropathology*. Washington, D.C.: Army Institute of Pathology of the Army Medical Museum, 1944. WL17.H422a 1944

This document is a syllabus of black and white photographs of a set of approximately 100 slides in neuropathology. The slides were compiled and donated to the Army Medical Museum by the American Psychiatric Association in 1944.

*Shock Therapy*. Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry (GAP), Committee on Therapy. Report No. 1, September 15, 1947.

This report summarizes the conclusions of the committee on the effectiveness of this therapy, and lists recommendations to prevent abuse and establish uniform criteria for evaluation of the treatment. There is also a page with the group's mission statement and a list of members by committee.

The **Mood Disorders Program** of University Hospitals Case Medical Center is conducting clinical research on the treatment of symptoms related to Major Depressive Disorder with Generalized Anxiety. The objective of the study is to determine if Quetiapine-XR (Seroquel) is effective and safe in this population. This is an 8-week study and participants have a 50% chance of receiving a placebo or the active medication. Participants include persons that are experiencing current depressive and anxiety symptoms, and must be 18 years of age and older.
