The second half of the Spring Semester is always a busy time with many activities happening on campus, and many decisions to make about the upcoming summer and fall semesters. March is an excellent time for reflection. You've learned a lot by now -- about yourself, your study habits, your interests, your relationships, and about Case, Cleveland, and the opportunities that are available to you. It's time to reflect on what you have learned and make plans for your future. What major (s) and minor(s) will you declare? How will you spend your summer? What activities will you explore in the upcoming year? Will you get involved in research or other creative endeavors? How can you enhance and enrich your collegiate experience? How can you make a difference? The March Newsletter contains a lot of information to assist you in this continued exploration and reflection process. Advising and Registration for Summer and Fall 2005 Classes

Academic advising starts on March 28th. Those of you declaring your major should contact your new departmental faculty advisor to set up an advising appointment in early April. If you are not ready to declare a major at this point, you will be working with your first year advisor to prepare for summer and fall advising. During your midterm advising appointment, you should set up a follow-up appointment to discuss your registration plans. **All undergraduates may start to register for Summer 2005 classes on April 18th.** **First year students (regardless of credit hours earned) are able to register for Fall 2005 classes on April 19th.** The Schedule of Classes for both Summer and Fall 2005 is available on-line at <http://www.cwru.edu/courses/catalog/>.

DON'T FREAK OUT! Case has incredible success at accommodating the registration needs of its students. It is very unlikely that you will be closed out of a class that you need. Keep in mind that very often courses can be taken during different semesters. Be flexible. Be patient. Be calm.

Declaring a Major - March 18th Deadline

Students who have decided on an academic major must declare their major by March 18, 2005. (The indication of major which you put on your admission application last year is not considered an official declaration. Declaration forms completed before this time may not have been processed.) First year students pursuing a major in Nursing should have previously been declared and need not complete a declaration of major form unless adding a second degree. Students still in the process of exploring academic options are not required to declare during this time frame; however, it is important that all first year students are working toward the clarification of academic interests.

YOUR MAJOR CAN BE CHANGED IF YOU CHANGE YOUR MIND LATER. If you change majors later on, that's fine -- many students do change (or add) majors as they discover new interests. **IF YOU STILL FEEL UNDECIDED,** but you have a pretty good idea of what your major will be, declare it so you'll be in touch with a departmental advisor. It's OK to change your mind later and "undeclare." **IF YOU'RE TRULY UNDECIDED,** continue to explore, to talk with your advisor and other faculty members, and to use the resources of the Career Center (Sears Room 206, 368-4446). So long as you are actively engaged in exploring your interests and in making a decision, you can hold off for a bit. However, you should try to reach a decision as soon as possible.

Carefully review the procedures listed below and complete this process by March 18, 2005.

1. Obtain a Declaration of Major Form in the Office of Undergraduate Studies, Sears 357 (also available in the 24-Hour Study Room in Wade), and take the form to the department representative in your intended major for his/her signature and assignment of a major advisor. A list of representatives is in your *2004 - 2005 Handbook for Undergraduate Students*, and is posted outside Sears 357.
2. All students must also select which General Education/Core Requirements they are following. **SAGES Participants:** Make sure that you *additionally* check that you are a SAGES participant.
3. Bring the completed form to the Office of Undergraduate Studies, Sears 357. *The declaration of major is not official unless it is submitted to the Office of Undergraduate Studies.*

Declaring a Minor

If you have an interest outside your major discipline but do not want to pursue an additional major or degree, you might consider a minor. A minor concentration usually requires 15 - 18 credit hours. Students completing the requirements for a minor will have the minor noted on their official transcript. Check out pp. 6-8 in your *2004-2005 Handbook for Undergraduate Students* to learn more about requirements and options. If you decide to select a minor, pick up a MINOR DECLARATION FORM from Sears 357 or the 24 - Hour Study Room in Wade. Then complete and return the form to our office in Sears.

Reminder - Incomplete Deadline, March 25th!

(*2004-2005 Handbook for Undergraduate Students*, p. 88)

By now you should have been working with your professor and you should be mostly finished with the process of making up your incomplete work. Your professor must submit a grade change form to the Office of Undergraduate Studies no later than the March 25th deadline. Incompletes not made up by this deadline will convert to a grade of "F."

Spring Final Exams Schedule

(*2004-2005 Handbook for Undergraduate Students*, pp. 84-85)

I've said it before, but have you done it yet?! It is important that you consult your course syllabi and the on-line final exam schedule. Final exams dates *will not* be altered to accommodate travel plans. Make sure you confirm your exam schedule and make your travel, work or school plans accordingly. NOTE: No student will be required to take more than two final examinations on a single day. A student who has three final examinations scheduled for a single day should go to the Office of Undergraduate Studies and obtain the assistance of the Dean in arranging to take one of those examinations on an alternative day during the final examination period. Similarly, a student with conflicting examinations should seek the assistance of the Dean of Undergraduate Studies in arranging to have the time of one examination changed.

Last Day to Withdraw from a Spring Semester Course - April 25th

(*2004-2005 Handbook for Undergraduate Students*, p. 87)

As a first year student, you are able to withdraw from classes until the last day of classes - April 25th. In order to withdraw from a class, you must complete a Drop/Add Form (available in Sears 357, 24 - Hour Study Room in Wade, or Yost 110) and get the signature of your advisor. Once that is complete, come to the Office of Undergraduate Studies for a Dean's signature. After you secure a Dean's signature, you must take the form to the Registrar's Office in Yost 110 for processing.



Spring Break!! March 7 - 11, 2005

It's time for a Break!! I hope you have a SAFE and FUN Spring Break! Campus offices will be open regular hours during Spring Break. However, RUSS (Residential Undergraduate Studies Satellite) will be closed during Spring Break. Make sure you view your midterm grades when you return: <http://my.case.edu>.

Spring Midterm Grades

Most of you have already had some tests, quizzes, and other assignments and many more of you are facing these in the first week of March. Professors should have midterm grades submitted to the Registrar by March 7th. Shortly thereafter, you will be able to log on to the *Case Portal* at <http://my.case.edu> to view your midterm grades.

Your first year advisor will be able to view your midterm grades on-line during the week of March 7th. **Please make sure that you contact your advisor for an appointment to discuss your progress thus far in the semester.** Remember, this is a good time to pause and reflect on your academic progress and decide if you need to make any changes to your study strategies. At this point in the semester, you definitely still have time to affect some positive changes. Please review the following list of tips and see if any might be appropriate for you.

- ☑ Talk to your professors regularly during office hours to ask questions and to get to know him/her. If you are not happy with your performance on an assignment, ASK HIM/HER WHAT HAPPENED!!
- ☑ Use SI sessions if available.
- ☑ Use the FREE tutoring services provided by Educational Services for Students (ESS). Check out FREE tutoring resources at <http://studentaffairs.case.edu/education/service/s/tutoring/default.html>. ESS staff will also meet with you individually to assess your individual time management and study strategies. ESS can be contacted at 368-5230 or in Sears 470.
- ☑ Reflect on the amount of time you are spending "studying." Is it enough? Are you studying during the time of day at which you are most alert? Could you use your study more efficiently and effectively?
- ☑ Consider forming a study group with your peers.

Looking for a Scholarship?

If you did not receive a Trustee's, President's or Provost's Scholarship upon matriculation in the fall, you are eligible to apply for a very limited number of these scholarships for the next academic year. In order to apply, you must meet the following criteria:

- ❖ A US Citizen or Permanent Resident
- ❖ A first, second or third year student in 2004-2005 who has not previously received a Trustee's, President's or Provost's Scholarship
- ❖ A cumulative GPA of at least 3.75 and at least 30 credit hours earned at Case in the academic year 2004-2005. (Advanced Placement and transfer credit hours will not be considered as part of the 30 hours earned.)

Applications are available in the Office of Undergraduate Studies in Sears 357, in the 24-Hour Study Room in Wade, on-line at <http://www.cwru.edu/provost/ugstudies/2005meritapp.pdf> and in the Office of Financial Aid and must be returned to the office in Sears 357 no later than April 15, 2005.

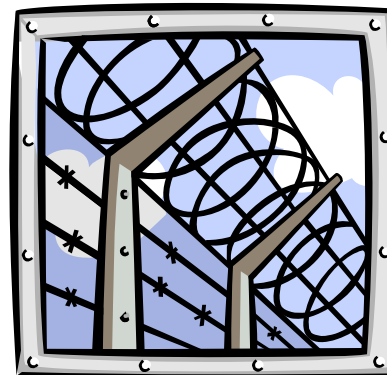

Steven Pinker, noted Harvard psychologist and cognition expert, to inaugurate Distinguished Lecture Series

Steven Pinker, the Johnstone Professor of Psychology at Harvard University and a world-renowned linguist and cognition expert, will deliver the first in Case Western Reserve University's annual Distinguished Lecture series. Pinker is best known for his books on language: *The Language Instinct* (1994), *How the Mind Works* (1997) and *Words and Rules: The Ingredients of Language*. In 2002 he published *The Blank Slate: The Modern Denial of Human Nature*, which explored the political, moral and emotional colorings of human nature. He is a three-time winner of the William James Book Prize.

A native of Montreal, Pinker holds a B.A. in experimental psychology from McGill University and a Ph.D. from Harvard. He taught at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1982-2003, when he moved to Harvard.

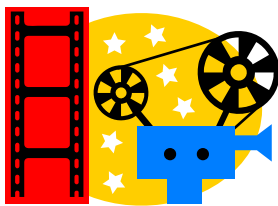
